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Leap Year, Love and Lent

Several traditions connected to a specific day of the year are attributed to and influenced by the stories of the saints. Leap Year and St Valentine's Day are just two of them.



Leap Year was traditionally the only day of the year when a woman could propose to a man. It was in Ireland in the fifth century that St Brigid complained to St Patrick that women were having to wait too long for their suitor to propose. Supposedly St Patrick offered women the opportunity to "pop the question" themselves, on the condition it was only every four years. In some parts of Europe if a man refused the woman's proposal he had to buy her twelve pairs of gloves, perhaps to hide the fact she was not wearing an engagement ring! According to Greek superstition it was considered unlucky to get married in a Leap Year.

There are several legends associated with St Valentine, who died on 14th February. Valentine, a priest and a physician, suffered martyrdom during the persecution of Christians by Emperor Claudius the second. It is said that while in prison, Valentine sent a letter to his jailor's daughter whom he had befriended and cured of blindness; he signed it "your Valentine". Another legend states that Valentine defied the emperor and secretly married couples to spare their husbands from going to war.

In 2024 14th February, as well as being St Valentine's Day, coincides with the beginning of the season of Lent, a very important six week period for many Christians world wide as they prepare for the great festival of Easter. It is a time of readying hearts and minds to reflect on Jesus' life, death and resurrection, remembering God's love for the world in sending his only son Jesus to live a human life.

The church clock

As you have probably noticed, the visible parts of the church clock have been restored to all their former glory.

The clock face is now a beautiful blue and the numerals and clock hands have been refurbished with gold leaf. (Yes it's expensive, but nothing resists the weather as well as real gold so the investment saves us the cost of expensive visits to repaint the numbers every few years.)

If you've heard the bells you can tell that they now ring properly rather than giving out the dull sound that we've been treated to in the last few years. Their mountings, which were rotting and rusting away, have all been replaced. But there's also lots of work that you can't see. The drive mechanism which transmits the movements of the clock inside the church to the hands and the bells has also been repaired, and all the cables that provide the energy to drive the clock and ring the bells have been replaced. The clock should be good for another 20 years.
